Seventh Grade Travels

to Charleston

In conjunction with their history and science classes, sev-

enth grade students visited Charleston County from May 2-4. Students and chaperones spent two nights on the historic USS Yorktown. The decommissioned aircraft carrier is anchored at Patriots Point Naval & Maritime Museum in Mount Pleasant at the mouth of the Cooper River on the Charleston Harbor.

On the ship, students and chaperones slept in traditional Navy berthing compartments and ate meals in one of the galleys. While onboard they heard stories of heroism and experienced behind the scenes of the World War II aircraft carrier. The students also toured a retired destroyer and a submarine.

Also at Patriots Point is the Vietnam Experience Exhibit, a fully immersive two-acre exhibit that brings Marine officers to life through holograms in a 3-D production. Set in a "Brown Water Navy" support base and a U.S. Marine Corps artillery fire base during the Tet Offensive and the Battle of Khe Sanh in 1968, the exhibit features more than a dozen components that simulate life during wartime, including helicopters, a river patrol boat, jeeps, and an ambulance.

The group also visited the Charles Towne Landing State Historic Site, which is situated on a marshy point located off the Ashley River, where a group of English settlers landed in 1670 and established what would become the birthplace of the Carolina colony. Charles Towne Landing introduces visitors to the earliest colonial history of Charleston through interactive hands-on exhibits, including the Adventure, Charleston's only

17th-century replica sailing ship. The grounds include 80 acres of gardens, with

an elegant live oak alley and the historic Legare Waring House.

To further their exposure to historically significant sights, the group took a boat ride to Fort Sumter National Historic Park, located in the Charleston Harbor. The fort is where Confederate forces fired the first shots of the Civil War upon Federal troops, and it would continue to serve as the focal point in Charleston throughout the Civil War.

The group spent a day on a boat tour with Barrier Island Eco-Tours and visited Capers Island where the students studied the ecology and enjoyed lunch on the beach. Scientific process and inquiry skills were promoted and reinforced throughout the field trip as students learned about organisms, habitats, communities, and ecosystems, as well as the environmental and geological factors that influence them.

For the first part of the boat trip, they explored the tidal creeks of the salt marsh and discussed the following topics: spartina grass and its role, plant/animal species identification, adaptations, oyster bed communities, species diversity, marsh hammock ecology, geology of the salt marsh, and the importance of the salt marsh to humans and the Atlantic Ocean.

The second part of the trip was spent on the beach at Capers Island State Heritage Preserve. With over 2,000 acres, Capers Island is a pristine barrier island with a diversity of shells, and the guides provided facts about the lives of the animals which made them. Other topics such as sediments, barrier island

formation, sand dune function, loggerhead

sea turtles, erosion and deposition, beach ecology, and the maritime forest were also discussed on the island.

Students hiked a mile-long trail that winds its way through the island before opening onto "bone-yard beach." Along the trail, they passed through different habitats including salt marsh, a freshwater pond, a large brackish water impoundment, the maritime forest, and an extensive dune field. On this path, the guides discussed topics including alligators, bird life/identification, uses of the maritime forest by humans, plant identification, and adaptations.

The trip was coordinated by Mrs. Molly McDuffie and the other chaperones were Mr. Lee Gandy, Mrs. Lori Gandy, Mr. Brent Kaneft '00, Mrs. Allyson Lowder Sanders '96 and Mr. Kurt Wilson.

JUNIOR-SENIOR PROM




