SHOOTING SPORTS WINS TWO STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS



Mrs. Frances James received the Margaret & Steve Bond Teaching Award and Mr. Glen Rector received the Shepard Kollock Nash Endowment Fund for Teacher Advancement.

Mrs. James, who teaches fifth grade social studies and science, is in her 14th year at Wilson Hall. She also serves as the advisor for the varsity cheerleading squad. The Shepard Kollock Nash Endowment Fund for Teacher Advancement, established by an anonymous donor, rewards an upper school faculty member for his or her service and dedication to Wilson Hall. The recipient is awarded a financial gift, resulting from the gift's investment income, to be used as a stipend in order to enrich the knowledge of the recipient relative to his or her area of instruction and, in turn, share that knowledge with students. Each recipient of the award receives \$7,000 to be used for a trip. In August, the recipients will make a presentation about their trip to the faculty and to their students.

Each faculty member who has completed at least five years of teaching at Wilson Hall is eligible to receive the award. Eligible faculty members will have their name submitted one time for each year they have served as a full-time teacher at Wilson Hall. A faculty member who has taught on a part-time basis may be eligible proportionally to the years of service and the number of class periods taught.

A random drawing for the award, one for an upper school teacher and one for a lower school teacher, takes place during a faculty meeting. Once selected, the recipient may not be eligible for consideration for a period of ten years.
