58 ADVANCED PLACEMENT SCHOLARS

Because of their exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement (AP) Exams, 58 students received recognition from the College Board. About 20 percent of students nationwide who took AP Exams performed at a sufficiently high level to earn an AP Scholar Award. In May, 99 Wilson Hall students became eligible to receive college credit by earning a score of 3 or higher on at least one exam. Wilson Hall's average passing rate is 81%, above the average passing rate of 67%. There was a record 123 Wilson Hall students who took a total of 282 exams.

The AP is a global academic program in more than 100 countries. AP Exams, which students take after completing challenging college-level courses taught at their high school, are graded on a five-point scale (5 being the highest). Most of the nation's colleges and universities award credit, advanced placement, or both for grades of 3 or higher. To qualify to teach an AP course, teachers must attend an intensive AP workshop held during the summer.

Fourteen AP Capstone Diploma Recipients

Because of their exceptional performance in the College Board's Advanced Placement (AP) Program, 14 students received the AP Capstone Diploma. Wilson Hall is the only school in the area approved by the College Board to offer the AP Capstone Diploma Program, which is based on two, year-long AP courses: AP Seminar and AP Research. The AP Capstone Diploma is granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research and on four additional AP Exams of their choosing.

Rather than teaching subject-specific content, the AP Research and Seminar courses develop students' skills in research, analysis, evidence-based arguments, collaboration, writing, and presenting. Both courses guide students through completing a research project, writing an academic paper, and making a presentation on their project. Students who complete the two-year program can earn one of two different AP Capstone awards (diploma or certificate) which are valued by colleges across the United States and around the world.

The College Board developed the AP Capstone Diploma program at the request of higher education professionals who saw a need for a systematic way for high school students to begin mastering these skills before college. Only 38 schools in South Carolina offer the program and Wilson Hall is one of only five private schools in the state to offer it. *Mrs. Susan Barfield*, Director of Academics, coordinates the school's AP program.


A Journey Through History: Barons Explore Greece & Haly

Students, faculty, and parents embarked on a remarkable journey of learning and discovery this summer as they traveled through Greece and Italy on a school-sponsored trip led by Mrs. Sarah Smith, College Counselor. From standing at the foot of the Parthenon to walking the ancient streets of Rome, students experienced history brought vividly to life. The adventure began in Athens, where students explored the Acropolis and stood on Mars Hill, where the Apostle Paul once preached. In Delphi, they reflected on classical wisdom amid the ruins of the ancient sanctuary. and in Arachova, they took in the charm of a traditional mountain town. One of the most memorable stops was St. Stephen Monastery in Kalampaka, dramatically perched on towering rock formations. The Greek portion of the trip ended with an overnight ferry from Igoumenitsa across the Adriatic Sea to Italy. Upon arrival in Ancona, the group took a scenic detour to San Marino, a mountaintop microstate known for its breathtaking views and medieval architecture. In Florence, students explored the historic city center, crossed the Ponte Vecchio, and

some climbed Brunelleschi's Duomo, an engineering marvel of the Renaissance, for sweeping views of the city. Rome offered a deeper dive into ancient and early Christian history with visits to the Colosseum, Roman Forum, Palatine Hill, and the Vatican Museums. Students observed how ancient pagan temples were transformed into Christian basilicas, some still in use today, and visited both St. Peter's Basilica and the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls, each a profound reminder of the city's spiritual and cultural legacy. Through every stop, students engaged deeply with the cultures, stories, and landmarks that have shaped Western civilization. The trip blended academic enrichment with unforgettable experiences, leaving students with lasting memories and a deeper appreciation for the rich heritage of Greece and Italy.


