Five Tapped for Veritas in Unitate Society

The society is a student award program developed to recognize academic service-based achievement of senior students throughout the S.C. Independent School Assoc. To be considered students must be nominated by their school and have a minimum of 50 hours of documented community service between June of the student's junior year and October of the student's senior year. Nominees, who must have a minimum grade point average of 3.0, are required to write an essay outlining the importance of community service, provide three letters of recommendation from school or community leaders who have witnessed their service activities, and receive a recommendation from their head of school.

Jones Presented Watt Award

Jeremiah Jones '24 received the Larry K. Watt Award presented by the S.C. Independent School Association to recognize the academic service-based achievements of seniors. It is one of the highest awards presented by the association, which has over 120 member schools, and Jeremiah is the only student who attends a 4A school in SCISA to receive the award. To be eligible for the award, the student must be nominated by the school and recommended by the head of school. The nominee must have a minimum of 50 hours of documented community service after June of the student's junior year and a minimum 3.0 GPA. Once nominated, the student must submit a 500-word essay outlining the importance of community service as well as three letters of recommendation from school or community leaders who have personally witnessed their service initiatives.

Mrs. Karen Jones taught for 10 years at Wilson Hall, most recently as the lower school Spanish teacher. She also taught 9th Grade Physical Science and 6th Grade Science in the past. *Mrs. Jones* served as an advisor for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and First Priority, the middle school's Christian outreach club. Throughout her tenure, she served on various accreditation committees and was a chairperson for the STEAM Committee. In addition to working as a faculty member, *Mrs. Jones* volunteered with the Parent-Teacher Organization and served as the Vice President of Administration.

Mrs. Ashley Wake, a Preschool 4 assistant teacher, worked for six years at Wilson Hall. Before entering the classroom, she worked at the gate house.

Ms. Emily Wachter taught for three years at Wilson Hall. She taught AP English Literature, AP Research, English 11, and English 12, and she was the advisor for the yearbook.

Record Number Take AP Exams

A record number of 263 Advanced Placement (AP) Exams were taken by Wilson Hall students in May. In 21 AP courses, 121 students either took an exam, submitted a portfolio, or submitted an AP Research project. *Mrs. Susan Barfield*, Director of Academics, coordinates the AP program.

For the AP Program, sponsored by The College Board, high school students across the country and around the world take AP courses and exams to challenge themselves, explore their interests, and earn college credit and placement. Nearly all colleges and universities in the United States grant credit and placement for qualifying AP scores.

Wilson Hall offers 22 AP classes, more than any school in the region, in the following academic disciplines: Arts, English, History & Social Sciences, Math & Computer Science, Sciences, and World Languages & Cultures. The classes are taught at the college-level by specially trained faculty.

Six Capstone Diploma Candidates

Olivia Beasley, Jennings Frerichs, Mary Margaret Griffin, Rhayne Owens, Maury Shuler and Mary Parish Williams, Class of '24, are Advanced Placement (AP) Capstone Diploma Candidates. Wilson Hall is the only school in the area approved by the College Board to offer the AP Capstone Diploma Program, which is based on two, yearlong AP courses: AP Seminar and AP Research. The AP Capstone Diploma is granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research and on four additional AP Exams of their choosing.

Rather than teaching subject-specific content, the AP Research and Seminar courses develop students' skills in research, analysis, evidence-based arguments, collaboration, writing, and presenting. Both courses guide students through completing a research project, writing an academic paper, and making a presentation on their project. Students who complete the two-year program can earn one of two different AP Capstone awards (diploma or certificate) which are valued by colleges across the United States and around the world.

The College Board developed the AP Capstone Diploma program at the request of higher education professionals who saw a need for a systematic way for high school students to begin mastering these skills before college. Only 38 schools in South Carolina offer the program and Wilson Hall is one of only five private schools in the state to offer it. *Mrs. Susan Barfield*, Director of Academics, is the AP coordinator.




