Wilson Hall is hosting best-selling Christian author Dane Ortlund as the keynote speaker for the Mission Series on October 2. The program will be held in the Nash Student Center at 7:00 PM, and the doors will open at 6:00 PM. The event is open to the public free of charge, and tickets are not necessary. Seating is on a first come, first served basis.

Pastor Ortlund is the author of several books, including Gentle and Lowly: The Heart of Christ for Sinners and Sufferers. He is also an editor for the Knowing the Bible series and the Short Studies in Biblical Theology series. He earned a Ph.D. from Wheaton College and is the senior pastor of Naperville Presbyterian Church in Naperville, Illinois.

In the fall of 2009, a family approached Wilson Hall with the idea of doing something for the community with a particular focus on young people. The family was interested in something that would impact the lives of our young people for the better and for their future. From that meeting was born the idea of bringing in a well-known, inspirational speaker who might offer to the local population a message of encouragement, a challenge to leadership, an invitation for the greater good. As a reflection of the desires of this community-minded family, the event was named the Wilson Hall Mission Series.



Because of their exceptional achievement on the college-level Advanced Placement (AP) Exams, 47 students received recognition from the College Board. About 20 percent of the 2.2 million students worldwide who took AP Exams performed at a sufficiently high level to earn an AP Scholar Award.

In May, 95 Wilson Hall students became eligible to receive college credit by earning a score of 3 or higher on

Wilson Hall is the only school in the area approved by the College Board to offer the AP Capstone Diploma Program, which is based on two, yearlong AP courses: AP Seminar and AP Research. The AP Capstone Diploma is granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research and on four additional AP Exams of their choosing.

Rather than teaching subject-specific content, the AP Research and Seminar courses develop students' skills in research, analysis, evidence-based arguments, collaboration, writing, and presenting.

at least one exam. Wilson Hall's average passing rate is 86%, above the global average passing rate of 60%. There were 111 Wilson Hall students who took a total of 255 exams.

The AP is a global academic program in more than 100 countries. AP Exams, which students take after completing challenging college-level courses taught at their high school, are graded on a five-point scale (5 being the highest). Most of the nation's colleges and universities award credit, advanced placement, or both for grades of 3 or higher. To qualify to teach an AP course, teachers must attend an intensive AP workshop held during the summer. Wilson Hall offers 22 AP courses, more than any school in Sumter, Clarendon, Kershaw and Lee counties.

Seven Teachers Attend AP Summer Institutes

Seven members of the faculty attended an Advanced Placement (AP) Summer Institute which offers the most thorough professional learning available for AP educators. Attendees engaged in 30 hours of content-rich training designed to strengthen how they teach their AP courses. Through their experience, they learned ready-to-use strategies and pedagogical tools shared by an experienced educator within the AP community.

The following teachers attended an institute: Mrs. Jessica Duke - AP Physics, Mrs. Martha Jo Smith Johnson '99 - AP Research, Mr. Brent Kaneft '00 - AP English Literature, Mr. Blane Russell '10 - AP Computer Science Principles, Mrs. Allyson Lowder Sanders '96 - AP Psychology, Mr. Hunter Sheridan - AP Computer Science Principles, and Ms. Hannah Smith - Pre-AP World History.

Both courses guide students through completing a research project, writing an academic paper, and making a presentation on their project. Students who complete the two-year program can earn one of two different AP Capstone awards (diploma or certificate) which are valued by colleges across the United States and around the world.

The College Board developed the AP Capstone Diploma program at the request of higher education professionals who saw a need for a systematic way for high school students to begin mastering these skills before college. Only 38 schools in South Carolina offer the program and Wilson Hall is one of only five private schools in the state to offer it.

Sarah-Jane Bates, Abby Bradley, Annabelle Branham, Frances Mac Elmore, Sara Hayes Ridgeway and Camryn Wilmes, Class of '25, received the AP Seminar and Research Certificate which is granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in both AP Research and AP Seminar.

Barfield Attends AP Conference

Mrs. Susan Barfield, Director of Academics, attended the College Board's Advanced Placement (AP) Annual Conference in Las Vegas. The conference brought together thousands of education professionals from the AP and Pre-AP communities and featured workshops, content-driven sessions, and exhibits. She had the opportunity to connect with new and experienced teachers of AP courses, AP chief readers, AP coordinators, and counselors.

Mrs. Barfield is one of only 20 people selected internationally by the College Board to serve as an AP Coordinator Consultant. AP coordinators assume primary responsibility for organizing and administering the AP programs at their schools. They also manage the ordering, receipt, distribution, administration, and return of AP Exam materials, making sure millions of students worldwide receive their AP scores.

Wilson Hall offers 22 AP classes, more than any school in the region, which provides students with the opportunity to earn college credit by taking college-level courses taught by specially trained teachers.

Wilson Hall hosted the second summer academy for The Center for Transformative Teaching & Learning. Teachers spent a week learning more about the science of learning and how to use insights from neuroscience, cognitive psychology, and education research to improve teaching and learning. Evan Bell `22 and Mikayla Ovrenovits `25, participating as interns, presented to the faculty about their learning journeys. In addition to the 15 Wilson Hall faculty members, 15 teachers from four other private schools participated as well.

The academy is the Center for Transformative Teaching and Learning's flagship Mind, Brain, and Education (MBE) conference for professional learning and pedagogical development. MBE is a young science started at Harvard University 26 years ago by uniting the fields of neuroscience, psychology, and education.

The educators and school leaders who attended received valuable science of teaching and learning resources created by teachers for teachers. 
